

A few words from the Senior Warden



As I read the opening address to the General Convention by our Presiding Bishop, I learned some valuable information about the world today. A lot of it is not very positive. The general convention of the Episcopal Church was Zoomed to many. The House of Deputies was separated from the House of Bishops. Many because of Covid, did not attend. This world is spiraling and rapidly. Many things have happened in the past few years. There have been riots fueled by racial reckoning, the expose of abuse in Indigenous boarding schools, the rise of hate groups, domestic terrorism, mass shootings by those believing a cleansing is needed, an attempt to overthrow the government of the United States, the murder of children at a grocery store in Buffalo, an elementary school in Uvalde, shooting at a fourth of July parade in Highland Park, and another shooting at an Episcopal Church in Alabama, and more child abuse in mainstream denominations and organizations, and the country of the Ukraine and its people murdered and their country destroyed.

Jesus said, "Love one another."

The Christian church struggles to survive in the midst of all of this. The Episcopal Church will begin a new social media program this summer designed to show us a way into the future. The study done by a marketing firm revealed that 84% of all the American population believe that Jesus is an important figure worth listening to. However, among those who identified as non-Christian, when asked about the "church," 50% associate the church with hypocrisy; 40% say its judgmental; 46% say its self-righteous; 46% said the church is arrogant. And finally, nearly half the non-Christians believe that racism is prevalent among Christians in the Church.

The good news is that 84% of all people believe Jesus is worth listening to. It is the mechanism that is in question. It is the results which fall short of the Gospel.

The gap is between what Jesus says and what His life represents and our actions in this world, in this country, in this city, in this church. Bishop Curry talks about how to begin to close that gap. In attempting to do this, lies in the survival of Christianity. At the last supper in John's Gospel, as Judas is about to betray Jesus, as he washes their feet, he tells them and us how to close that gap. He gave us the answer over 2,000 years ago. He gave us a commandment. This was not a suggestion, this was not up for discussion, this was a commandment.

"... I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another."

That's the answer to how we can close the gap. How have we done in the past 2,000 years? How have we done in this country? In this church? If we are practicing this commandment, and if the people of the world see this, don't you think there would be more people participating in Christianity?

This is the point in the article where we should stop and sing this song.

1 My hope is built on nothing less
than Jesus' blood and righteousness;
I dare not trust the sweetest frame,
but wholly lean on Jesus' name.

3 His oath, his covenant, his blood,
support me in the whelming flood;
when all around my soul gives way,
he then is all my hope and stay. [Refrain]

2 When darkness veils his lovely face,
I rest on his unchanging grace;
in every high and stormy gale,
my anchor holds within the veil. [Refrain]

Refrain:
On Christ, the solid Rock, I stand:
all other ground is sinking sand;
all other ground is sinking sand.

There is truth in those words. Standing on the rock of Christ means following his commandment. No matter where else we stand, for whatever reason, for whatever prejudice, for whatever justification, we are on sinking sand! Closing the gap means taking this commandment seriously. Changing people's impression of the church means accepting everyone. There is room in this world, there is room in this church for everyone. Let's make this a welcoming place.

The next time you say something hurtful to someone, the next time you think ill of another, the next time you criticize someone out of malice or ego, the next time you show prejudice rather than love, remember that you are part of the problem and closing the gap is the solution. I have to remember these words most of all. I get so frustrated with others at times, and the church is the place that we need to heal not hurt, to reconcile not divide.

Bishop Curry finished his address with the following:

"There's ancient wisdom here. Because when Christ is the center, when we say yes to the way of unselfish, sacrificial love, then we do the work of racial reconciliation and justice. Then we're able to do the work of truth-telling and reckoning and healing. And then we can help our church and help our land be a land where there's plenty good room for all of God's children. So remember. Remember where you came from. Remember your baptism. Remember this Jesus. Remember and be re-membered as God's new creation, God's beloved, God's precious child. And remember, as the late Bishop Barbara Harris told us over and over again, the God behind you is greater than any problem ahead of you.

"My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness. I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly lean on Jesus' name. On Christ the solid rock I stand. All other ground is sinking sand."

God love you. God bless you. And may God hold us all in those almighty hands of love. Amen." . . . and AMEN!

Company Fruit Salad

Ingredients

- 4 medium Golden Delicious apples, diced
- 4 medium Red Delicious apples, diced
- 2 cups seedless green grapes, halved
- 2 cups seedless red grapes, halved
- 1 can (20 ounces) pineapple chunks, drained
- 1 can (11 ounces) mandarin oranges, drained

Dressing:

- 3 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup sugar

In a large bowl, combine the first 6 ingredients. In a small bowl, beat dressing ingredients until smooth. Pour over fruit; toss gently to coat.

Experiment with different fruit-and-nut flavor combinations in your fruit salads, such as peaches and pecans; apples and walnuts; cherries and almonds; or pineapple and macadamia nuts.

An Invitation
 from Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry
 to Practice the Way of Love

I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. — Ephesians 3:17-19

In the first century Jesus of Nazareth inspired a movement. A community of people whose lives were centered on Jesus Christ and committed to living the way of God's unconditional, unselfish, sacrificial, and redemptive love. Before they were called "church" or "Christian," this Jesus Movement was simply called "the way."

Today I believe our vocation is to live as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. But how can we together grow more deeply with Jesus Christ at the center of our lives, so we can bear witness to his way of love in and for the world?

The deep roots of our Christian tradition may offer just such a path. For centuries, monastic communities have shaped their lives around rhythms and disciplines for following Jesus together. Such a pattern is known as a "Rule of Life." The framework you now hold — **The Way of Love: Practices for Jesus-Centered Life** — outlines a Rule for the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement.

It is designed to be spare and spacious, so that individuals, ministry groups, congregations, and networks can flesh it out in unique ways and build a church-wide treasure trove of stories and resources. There is no specific order you need to follow. If you already keep a Rule or spiritual disciplines, you might reflect and discover how that path intersects with this one. By entering into reflection, discernment and commitment around the practices of **Turn — Learn — Pray — Worship — Bless — Go — Rest**, I pray we will grow as communities following the loving, liberating, life-giving way of Jesus. His way has the power to change each of our lives and to change this world.

THE WAY OF LOVE
Practices for Jesus-Centered Life

What is the Way of Love?

The Way of Love is a way of life. More than a program or curriculum, it is a return to the ancient pathways and Rules of Life that followers of Jesus have observed for centuries. They knew the power of commitment to a core set of practices – Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, **Go**, Rest – and the power of gathering in a small group where you find love and support for living into these commitments. If we hope to not only worship Jesus but to grow more like him and bear his redeeming love in the world, we can adopt a rule of life like the Way of Love and find a community with which to practice it.

What is a Rule of Life? How Do I Begin? A Rule of Life is an intentional commitment to a set of practices that provide guidance, rhythm and inspiration for living a beautiful, meaningful and holy life. As we place these practices at the heart of our daily lives and join with companions who share the commitment, we grow more and more in the unselfish, hope-filled Way of Love that Jesus embodied in the world.

REST: Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. – John 14:27

Blessed are you, O Lord ... giving rest to the weary, renewing the strength of those who are spent. – Book of Common Prayer, 113

From the beginning of creation, God has established the sacred pattern of going and returning, labor and rest. Especially today, God invites us to dedicate time for restoration and wholeness - within our bodies, minds, and souls, and within our communities and institutions. By resting we place our trust in God, the primary actor who brings all things to their fullness.

For Reflection and Discernment

- ⇒ What practices restore your body, mind, and soul?
- ⇒ • How will you observe rest and renewal on a regular basis?
- ⇒ • With whom will you commit to create and maintain a regular practice of rest?

This is the last step of The Way of Love.
