A Message from Father Martin

Here is my first sermon here at St. Andrew's as Interim:

Opening prayer: Lord, open our ears that we may hear the words you have for us this morning. And open our hearts to receive the grace by which you have brought us together for reasons we may not yet fully understand.

Good morning. I am Martin Yabroff, and I have been called by your Vestry and our Bishop to serve as Interim Pastor here at St. Andrew's. I am excited and humbled and a little over-whelmed to serve here with you all, and with you to serve as God leads and guides and enables us in this, God's Church.

Now I am comforted by our Collect for today, which sets the stage for my coming and for our ministries together: "Grant us, O Lord, to trust in you with all our hearts; for, as you always resist the proud who confide in their own strength, so you never forsake those who make their boast of your mercy..."

So my coming to serve here with you all is not all about me. It is about what God can do and seeks to do through us all.

Having said that, let me tell you a bit about myself, and then let us consider the lessons appointed for us this morning. (While I am introducing myself here and now, I look forward to meeting with you more personally and to hearing your stories.)

About me. I just turned 66 last week. I grew up in Los Gatos and met my wife Eve at UCSC. We have been married 42 years and have 6 children and 8 grandchildren with one more on the way. After seminary, I was ordained through St. Mary's by-the-Sea, Pacific Grove, then came to Scotts Valley in 1987 to help start St. Philip's Episcopal Church there. (Fr. Joe Kennedy, rector at the time here, shared in the vision of this new church-plant, and the initial 6 households were St. Andrew's members who lived in Scotts Valley.)

We served in Scotts Valley for 17 years, as that congregation grew and developed its property. We then moved to South Bend, Indiana, where I was Dean of St. James' Cathedral for almost 3 years. Then for family reasons we moved back to the West coast, to Tacoma, WA. I served 14 years as rector of St. Andrew's, Tacoma (interesting coincidence!). I retired last Fall from full-time parish ministry. But I am not done as a pastor and priest, and I am excited to serve here with you as part-time Interim.

We have bought a house in Felton, and our youngest daughter Annie and her family, including her 1 and 3 year old children, live in Santa Cruz. So here we are.

A little bit on where I am coming from theologically. I believe in Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior. I believe that God sees and understands far more than you and I ever . can, which is to say I am still learning and growing in faith. I believe that all persons are created in God's image, and we are called to love and respect and welcome all persons in the Church, regardless of their race or ethnic background or their gender or sexual orientation. We are called to

welcome and encourage all persons in their spiritual journeys, as children of God, whatever their religious or spiritual paths – respecting their traditions and sharing our own understanding of the loving, liberating and life-giving way of Jesus.

I am very glad to be an Episcopalian these days. The mission of the Episcopal Church, according to our Book of Common Prayer (p. 855) is to restore all people to unity with God and each other. As Christians we do this through our relationship with Christ.

If that seems overwhelming as mission – too much to aspire to – and sometimes it does, then I and we need to remember that this is God's Church, this is God's mission, with Jesus as the head of the Church. Throughout my priestly ministry, and especially as we were planting St. Philip's, I have kept Psalm 127 in front of me. It begins:

Unless the Lord builds the house, their labor is in vain who build it.

Unless the Lord watches over the city, in vain the watcher keeps their watch.

*It is in vain that you rise so early and go to bed so late; vain, too, to eat
the bread of (anxious) toil, for the Lord gives to his beloved sleep. . . .*

Let us now consider our lessons for today in terms of what is going on in our lives and here at St. Andrew's.

Our first lesson, from the prophet Jeremiah, offers us the beautiful image of a potter working with clay. The clay does not form itself into a beautiful and useful vessel. Instead, it is worked, formed and molded by the potter. As Jeremiah watched the potter at his or her wheel, he thought about how God is our potter, and we are clay in the potter's hands.

The early Church teacher St. Irenaeus reminds us that to be formed, the clay must be moist and pliable. We also need to keep our souls – our lives – soft and moist and pliable so that God our potter can form us for God's purposes. If we become hard and brittle, the clay must be broken and reconstituted to be worked again.

Our psalm today tells us that God has fashioned us, each in our own uniqueness and diversity. And God is with every one of us, even though sometimes you and I may feel all alone, or forgotten, or of no account. But God does know what is going on with each of us, and God cares, and loves us, and has plans for us: "Plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope".(Jer. 29:11) beyond what we may know or understand right now.

Our Epistle lesson is the whole of Paul's Letter to Philemon. There is a lot in this reading. Over-all, Paul encourages Philemon (and us) to live and make decisions in light of God's love for us – God's grace in our lives. That is, we do not live just to ourselves, with our own expectations and preferences alone. We are loved, forgiven, blessed by our merciful and generous God. That makes a great deal of difference in how we live.

Garden of Eatin'



An easy 5-ingredient recipe for cheese tortellini with pesto and a mix of roasted vegetables.

- 1 medium zucchini, halved lengthwise and sliced into half moons
- 1 small red onion, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 1 pint cherry or grape tomatoes (about 2 cups)
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Kosher salt
- Ground black pepper

•2 (9-ounce) packages fresh cheese tortellini
•1/3 cup store-bought or [homemade](#) basil pesto



Place the zucchini, red onion, and 1 pint cherry tomatoes on a rimmed baking sheet. Drizzle with 2 tablespoons olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Toss well to coat and spread in an even layer. Roast at 425 degrees until tender and caramelized, 20 to 25 minutes. Meanwhile, bring a large pot of salted water to a boil.

When the vegetables are ready, add the tortellini to the boiling water and cook according to package instructions until al dente. Drain and return the tortellini to the the pot off the heat. Add the roasted vegetables and 1/3 cup basil pesto, and toss well to combine.

An Invitation
 from Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry
 to Practice the Way of Love

I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. — Ephesians 3:17-19

In the first century Jesus of Nazareth inspired a movement. A community of people whose lives were centered on Jesus Christ and committed to living the way of God's unconditional, unselfish, sacrificial, and redemptive love. Before they were called "church" or "Christian," this Jesus Movement was simply called "the way."

Today I believe our vocation is to live as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. But how can we together grow more deeply with Jesus Christ at the center of our lives, so we can bear witness to his way of love in and for the world?

The deep roots of our Christian tradition may offer just such a path. For centuries, monastic communities have shaped their lives around rhythms and disciplines for following Jesus together. Such a pattern is known as a "Rule of Life." The framework you now hold — **The Way of Love: Practices for Jesus-Centered Life** — outlines a Rule for the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement.

It is designed to be spare and spacious, so that individuals, ministry groups, congregations, and networks can flesh it out in unique ways and build a church-wide treasure trove of stories and resources. There is no specific order you need to follow. If you already keep a Rule or spiritual disciplines, you might reflect and discover how that path intersects with this one. By entering into reflection, discernment and commitment around the practices of **Turn — Learn — Pray — Worship — Bless — Go — Rest**, I pray we will grow as communities following the loving, liberating, life-giving way of Jesus. His way has the power to change each of our lives and to change this world.

Practices for Jesus-Centered Life

What is the Way of Love?

The Way of Love is a way of life. More than a program or curriculum, it is a return to the ancient pathways and Rules of Life that followers of Jesus have observed for centuries. They knew the power of commitment to a core set of practices – Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, **Go**, Rest – and the power of gathering in a small group where you find love and support for living into these commitments. If we hope to not only worship Jesus but to grow more like him and bear his redeeming love in the world, we can adopt a rule of life like the Way of Love and find a community with which to practice it.

What is a Rule of Life? How Do I Begin? A Rule of Life is an intentional commitment to a set of practices that provide guidance, rhythm and inspiration for living a beautiful, meaningful and holy life. As we place these practices at the heart of our daily lives and join with companions who share the commitment, we grow more and more in the unselfish, hope-filled Way of Love that Jesus embodied in the world.

A Message from Father Martin (Continued)

Now our Gospel is where this all gets very hard. Jesus' words about hating one's "father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters . . . and even life itself" is harsh and startling. He wants to get our attention!

Of course, we love our families, and hopefully life itself. But our families or anything other than God cannot be our highest value, our highest priority, or the basis of salvation.

Some of you may be familiar with the 12 Steps of AA and other recovery programs. (They contain profound spiritual teaching.) One must realize that one is powerless on one's own about alcoholism or addiction, or sin. It is only by turning to and trusting in and relying on a higher power – God – that we can move towards sobriety and sanity and salvation. We cannot do it on our own human strength (mighty and capable as you may be.)

Jesus speaks of building a tower. You and I cannot build up this parish just on our own (your very able Wardens and Vestry and all of this active and hard-working congregation notwithstanding.) We cannot on our own overcome all the forces and barriers of our society and this crazy world. We must count the cost – consider our mission and our own limits – and realize that we cannot do this all on our own. And as we trust God, and together seek God's will and direction (together – I am not here to tell you, this is a team effort), then we are in for an exciting and wonderful ministry together.

One last scripture, which has been at the forefront of my being a priest and pastor these 37 years, is Ephesians 3:20-21:

Glory to God whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine: Glory to God from generation to generation in the Church, and in Christ Jesus for ever and ever. Amen.
