# Eatin'

## Boston Baked Beans

From an old cookbook that my mother gave me – published 1931 – Boston Baked Beans made the old fashioned way. Yummy! Sue Roe

3 cups pea beans  
2 teaspoons salt  
3 tablespoons molasses  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon mustard  
boiling water  
1/2 pound salt pork  
one medium onion



Soak the beans over night in cold water. Bring to a simmering point and cook until the skins begin to burst. Drain and put in a bean pot or casserole (oven proof). Mix the seasoning with a cup of boiling water and add. Pour boiling water over the salt pork, scrape the surface of the rind and cut through every half inch. Bury it in the beans so that just the rind is exposed. Skin the onion and bury whole in the beans. Cover all with boiling water – and add water from time to time during the cooking. Bake, covered, at 300 degrees for 6 to 8 hours. Serves 12.

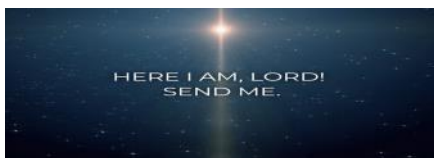

## Thoughts from a Parish Member

Isaiah heard the voice of the Lord calling and asking who to send, and so Isaiah responded, “Here I am, send me.” And so it came to pass,



Sunday’s hymn says, “Here I **am**, **Lord**. Is it I, **Lord**? I have heard you calling in the night. I will go, **Lord**, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart.”

And Isaiah went, out to the people and shared with them God’s word. “The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners.”

We are all prisoners and captives of a sort. Rousseau said we are born free, but everywhere we are in chains. Chains bind us all. Getting rid of them is perhaps the hardest thing about being a Christian. If the goal is loving one another, then the journey getting there means having to shed the chains of oppression we try to put on others.

I know there are subjects we don’t discuss in church. It would be too upsetting to hear other peoples opinion about politics, international relations, prejudice, and many other forbidden subjects. However, the journey to the cross, where we abandon all the chains that bind us, is difficult, dangerous for some, and many of us never get there. I always seem to get lost from the garden of Gethsemane to Calvary. Over the years some of the chains that keep me tethered, are ones that I have become so comfortable carrying, that I don’t even realize they are there.

And so I hear the hymn this Sunday, “here I am Lord, I have heard you calling in the night. I will go, **Lord**, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart.” I want so bad to hear the voice calling me, and I want so much to respond, “Here I am Lord.”

I want to be a Christian in my heart, mind, and soul. The world around me is busy repeating history. It is difficult to transcend history and step into God’s blanket of love. It is difficult to let go of the past and move forward. It is difficult to allow our scars to melt away. However reaching the goal means taking the journey. The journey won’t be easy, it will have obstacles, it will mean lifting off chains, it will mean keeping moving forward ... no turning back, no turning back. So, if you see me faltering or stumbling, help me, and remind me to keep moving forward on the journey to God’s all powerful healing love, and if you can, join me in the journey.
