A Message from Father Martin

Dear Friends,

I believe that a good way to enter this new year, with all its opportunities and uncertainties, its blessings and challenges, is with two watchwords: gratitude and light.

Let us be thankful for all that is good and true and beautiful – for the people around us and the place where we live, for the gift of being alive, for God's love for each one of us which passes our understanding. Such gratitude, practiced day by day, moment by moment, can ground us as we face our anxieties and uncertainties.

And light. Christ is the Light of the world. As we heard last Sunday, God's light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it. Let us walk into this New Year with grateful hearts and with open minds and eyes for the light of Christ.

We have a busy January ahead. St. Andrew's Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 19, beginning with worship and Pastor's Report at 10 am and continuing in the Parish Hall for elections and discussion. I hope that the Annual Reports and Financial Statements will be available a week ahead – January 12 – for you to pick up and read.

We will elect members to our 7 member Vestry and two Delegates and one Alternate for our Diocesan Delegation. If you are interested in being a Delegate and interacting with other congregations and leaders of our diocese, please let me know.

Then on Sunday, February 2, our bishop, The Right Rev. Lucinda Ashby, will make her Visitation, beginning with 10 am worship. We will follow the service with a parish potluck and open discussion with our bishop, as we did last year.

If you are interested in reaffirming your faith through Confirmation, Reception or Reaffirmation of Baptismal Promises when the Bishop visits, please see me ASAP to talk about this and to prepare. (You can learn more about Confirmation in the BCP pp.413-419; 860.)

Also in January, we welcome the Long Term Recovery Group of Santa Cruz County (sccltrg.org) to rent the upstairs main meeting room of our Parish building Monday-Friday, 9-5. They will be coordinating further disaster relief after the CZU fire and helping households rebuild.

The ACA twelve-step group will continue to meet weekly in the evening.

Bible Study continues on Tuesdays from 11 am to Noon. We are beginning the gospel of John. All are welcome – no Bible knowledge or background required.

Finally, we have received a grant from our diocese to replace the emergency back ramp to the second-floor meeting room. That work will take place in January. Thanks to our Junior Warden John Woolliscroft for his work on the upstairs restrooms and office.

St. Andrew's is a vital and (slowly) growing congregation serving our community and world with the love of God through Jesus Christ. I encourage you to participate in our Annual Meeting (January 19) and our Bishop's Visit (February 2). Share in what God is doing in and through this church! And celebrate in these sometimes dark days that the Light cannot and will not and shall not be overcome. Thanks be to God!

Garden of Eatin'

This recipe is very quick and easy to make. You can also use chicken rather than turkey, but it is great to use up those turkey leftovers.

Turkey Enchiladas

- 1 can Cream of Chicken Soup
- 6 ounces Sour Cream
- 1 small can diced Green Chilis
- 1/4 cup Milk
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar Cheese (or Mexican Cheese mix)
- 2 cups dices Turkey (or Chicken)
- 1/3 cup chopped Onion
- Flour Tortillas

Combine cream of chicken soup, sour cream, and green chilis. Separate into two halves.

In the first half, add turkey, cheese, onion. Spread some of the filling on each flour tortilla and place in a lightly oiled baking dish.

In the second half, add milk and stir well. Pour the sauce over the enchiladas. Top all with remaining cheese.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes until heated through and browned on top.

But she never could find where the Christ Child lay.

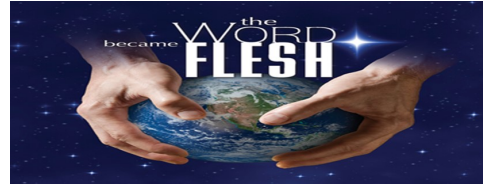
And still she wanders at Christmastide,

Thoughts for the New Year [2025]

Our presiding Bishop Sean Rowe tells us that “of the Christmas Gospels, Luke is surely the crowd pleaser. Nearly our entire visual vocabulary of Christmas—



the manger, the shepherds, the angels—comes from the second chapter of Luke. But if you go to church on Christmas Eve, you will hear the beginning of the Gospel of John, which includes other words we all know: “And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us...” He said that Christmas does not truly begin for him until he hears those words.

Bishop Rowe continues by saying that “While Luke paints us a picture of a noisy and chaotic birth, in John we encounter the powerfully quiet mystery of the Incarnation. John brings us the astonishing truth that God lived among us as a person, “full of grace and truth,” ready to share the pain and sorrow of being human. Especially this year, our hurting and divided world is desperate for the Incarnation. We live, as have many generations before us, in a time of fear, division, and instability. The Enemy has turned us against one another, sometimes in our own families and communities. The land of Jesus’ birth is torn apart by violence and tremendous suffering, and across the globe, we have hardened our hearts against the strangers among us. All too often, we hear voices that claim the mantle of Christianity calling most loudly for exclusion and conquest.”

Those sobering words of his message caught my attention. The theologian Paul Tillich said that the church is a hospital. In a sense that is true. (But please let it be a good hospital). If we want to help animals who need rescuing, we join the SPCA. If we are against drunk driving we join MADD. There are so many “healing” organizations out there for whatever cause you advocate. What do we join to stop war, killing, exclusion, and other hate? Many of us turn toward the church. We come together to be part of a better world.

Sometimes I hear people say, “What can one person do?” That’s a good question. And then the cold water of reality slaps me in the face. Over 2,000 years ago, “the word became flesh and lived among us.” That one man believed there is a better world. He recruited disciples.

From that beginning, from one person, the idea was planted and it has blossomed. Today there are over 2.4 billion people who identify as Christians. That’s what one person can do! That’s what one person did! I am not saying that we always get it right. I am not saying that Christianity is perfect. It can only be as perfect as the people in it. I am saying that the ultimate goal of Christianity is to love and accept all people. Christianity is people gathering to spread the good news, to feed the poor, to bind the wounds of the people, and to release the

chains that bind us and keep us from giving and experiencing that unconditional love. Another new year is upon us, Another opportunity to reach out to others, another year to try and get it right.

My mother was sick and ended up in a nursing home for a short period of time. My brother came East to be with us. He was a great support to her and me. We would go to the home a couple times day and spend time with her. On entering the home, in the main lobby, were a group of elderly patients arranged in their wheel chairs in a circle. They were silent for the most part and just looked at each other with this blank stare.

It became my brother's and my routine as we walked through the circle to stop and say hello to each of those lonely people. They smiled. The nurses were surprised. No one does this, they said. We learned that their families abandoned them to the nursing home and some were never visited by relatives or friends. Something inside me said, this is wrong! How can you just leave your mother or father or sister or brother here and not come and continue to love them? Who could do that to a loved one?

It's 2025, we and the church have another year to try and get it right. We have another year to make a difference in others' lives. It doesn't matter how small or large a difference, what matters is that we do something. Jesus gave his life. What we do with the time we have left is important. There is a world out there that needs our help. Take this New Year and reach out and make a difference to another person. Show the world that God is Love!

In conclusion: Christ said, "Love thy neighbor." When asked "who is thy neighbor?" He talked about the parable of the Good Samaritan. Everyone is your neighbor. If this is true and a necessary component of Christianity, then substitute the words Immigrant and Palestinian for Samaritan. Many modern day Christians would object to this. It would show them how far they have strayed from the original message by Christ. "Love one another as I have loved you!"

Limitless Horizons Ixil — 1/4 of available funds for the Guatemalan school.

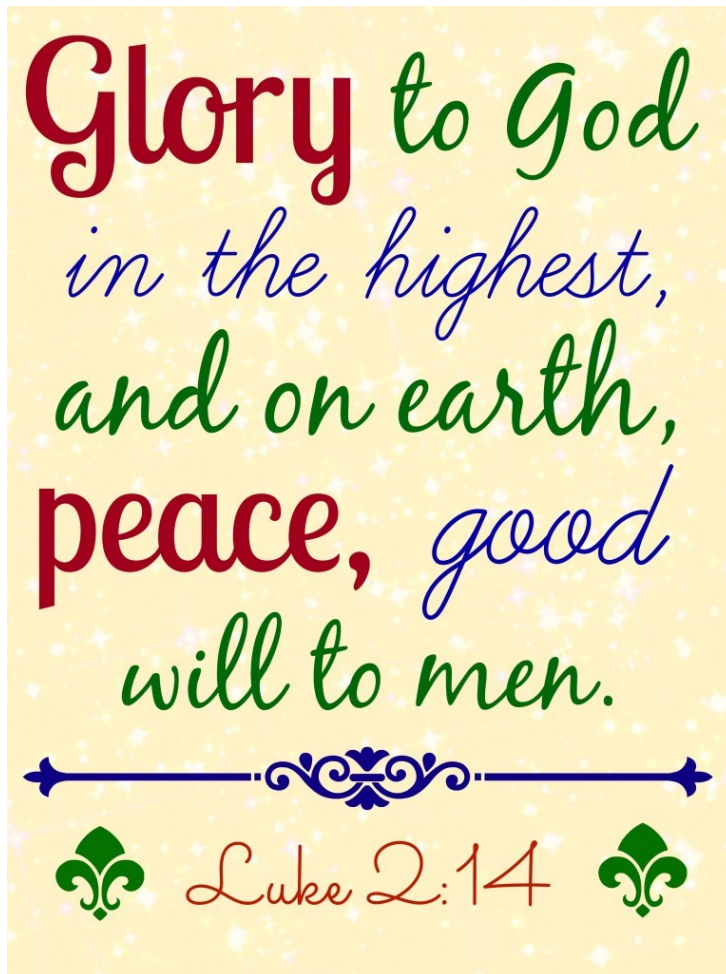
Episcopal Relief and Development — 1/4 of available funds for general relief.
