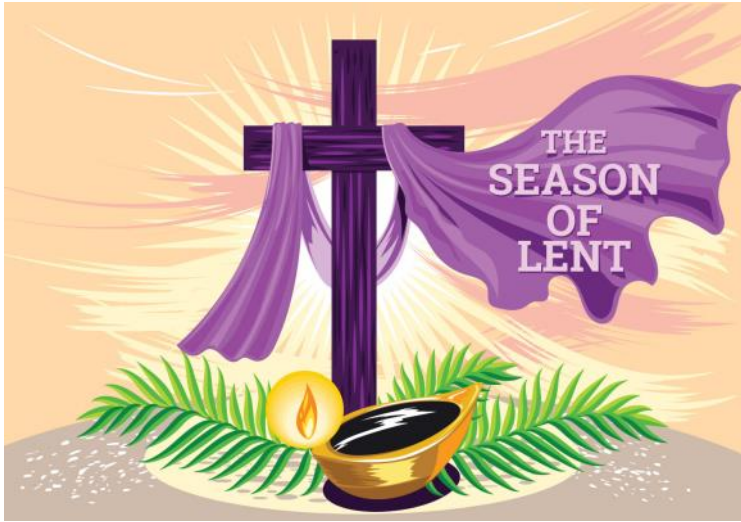

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A Message from Father Martin

Dear Friends,

We begin this March - a season of spiritual renewal known as Lent. On Tuesday, March 4 we prepare with **Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper**, from 5 to 6:30 pm in our Parish Hall. The next day, March 5, is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. We will offer two services for entering this spiritual renewal season, with repentance and turning again towards God, remembering God's gracious welcome to our turning, and celebrating Holy Communion together. The **Ash Wednesday services will be at 12 Noon and 7:00 pm.**

At our Sunday worship services during Lent (except on the First Sunday in Lent), we will reaffirm our Baptismal Promises each Sunday in place of the Nicene Creed. In these tumultuous days for our nation, our baptismal promises remind us what we can be doing and focusing on week in and week out. Beyond all the things we cannot affect or control, we can grow spiritually with Scripture, prayer and fellowship, we can turn to the Lord when we get distracted, we can seek and serve Christ in all persons, we can proclaim the Good News of Jesus wherever we are, and we can seek justice and respect the dignity of every human being. These are how we live in 'interesting times'.

Our **Lenten Soup and Discussion series** will be on Wednesdays from 5 to 6:30 pm, beginning on March 19. Our four sessions will focus on the Way of Love: practices for following Jesus. There are 7 practices, and we will consider and discuss two at each session. The practices are: **Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, Rest.** I will lead our discussions as we share what these practices might mean for each of us.

Please **read one of the four Gospels during Lent or choose some spiritually nurturing reading for this season.** If you would like to meet to talk about your spiritual journey, please let me know – I welcome such informal and confidential conversations.

Remember in all the ups and downs of our journeys and lives, God’s grace and love are given unconditionally. May this holy season be a time for us to renew our sense of God’s grace and love in our own lives. And may we encourage one another in following Jesus’ Way of Love.

Eatin'

Jumbo Breakfast Cookies

2 cups white sugar

1 cup peanut butter

1 cup butter

1/2 cup water

2 tablespoons vanilla extract

2 large eggs

2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 cups rolled oats

1 1/2 cups raisins

6 cups toasted oat cereal rings (such as Cheerios)

As desired, add chocolate chips or substitute dried cranberries for raisins.

Heat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix sugar, butter, water, vanilla and eggs until smooth in a large bowl. Combine flour, baking soda and salt and stir into the cookie batter; add oats and raisins, and gently stir in the cereal.

Drop 1/2 cupfuls of dough on an ungreased cookie sheet spaced about 4 inches apart. Flatten cookies to 1 inch thick.

Bake about 10 to 12 minutes, until lightly browned around the edges.

Cool for about 5 minutes, before placing in rack.

Makes 24 cookies.

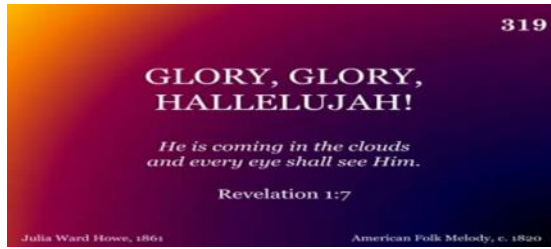

Thoughts from a Member of the Parish



"We are so convinced that past evils must repeat themselves that we make them repeat themselves. We dare not risk a new life in which the evils of the past are totally forgotten; a new life seems to imply new evils, and we would rather face evils that are already familiar. Hence, we cling to the evil that has already become ours and renew it from day to day, until we become identified with it and change is no longer thinkable." — Thomas Merton

Here we are again in Lent. As church-going Christians, we live this cycle of Biblical momentum. It is time to tell others what we have "given up" for Lent. Sticking with that decision makes us better Christians. We then move through the season feeling good about our unselfish decisions and look to the Cross as the reward.

The heart of Christianity is Love and Forgiveness. When we see another person, whether it is someone we know or don't know, do we recognize the God inside them? After all, we are all made in the image of God. Or do we put labels on them and judge them according to current ideas about those labels? Jesus asked His disciples to follow Him. There was no expectation of striving to be successful in a human context. There was no expectation of being popular, rich, well-dressed, or any attributes except that of seeing God in others. Our life should be about encountering others by looking beyond their appearances and our feelings and loving them just because they are also children of God, just as you and I are.

Lent should be about coming to terms with our Christianity. Forgiveness is about loving another whether or not they have wronged you. Love is always unconditional. I have heard people say, "I will love you IF you do this or that." The word IF is an indication that your love is not unconditional. Love and forgiveness do not have restrictions.

It is interesting to be at Bible Study and listen to different chapters of this book being read. We then try to interpret it and understand it. It is difficult trying to understand a document written so long ago and the context in which it was written. We have come up with some remarkable thinking. However, if we try to live the essence of what is being said, it's difficult. How do we shed human thoughts about greed, lust, jealousy, and hate? The Jesus of the Bible, the Son of God, the Holy Spirit, asks us to do just that. Give up your human desires and follow Him. That's easy, right?

Here is it Lent again. We begin our journey to the cross. The world around us is in chaos. Heads of state, rulers of nations, kings and presidents, act on human ambition and greed in a quest for power. However, for us who are on that pilgrimage to Calvary, it is God leading the way. The secular world, making secular decisions, trying to reach secular goals, will reap from the field what they sow. The rest of us will march toward the Cross of Jesus by loving and forgiving and looking forward to the possibilities of a new world. Glory, Glory Hallelujah! His truth is marching on . . . and on. . . and on.

Those who know not love, know not God, for God is love!
